4TH OF JULY EVENTS

We're looking forward to 4th of July even though planning has been difficult with all the changes in the village. The day will start at 7 a.m. with a Pancake Breakfast at Fire Station 1.

The children's parade will start at 10 a.m. sharp with the regular parade following. The parade routes will be basically the same but the line-up and start will be a bit different. Children will gather on Headley Street on the north side of the Ada intersection. The route will go west (right) on Ada to Thornapple River Drive and will cut out at Headley, the same as in past years.

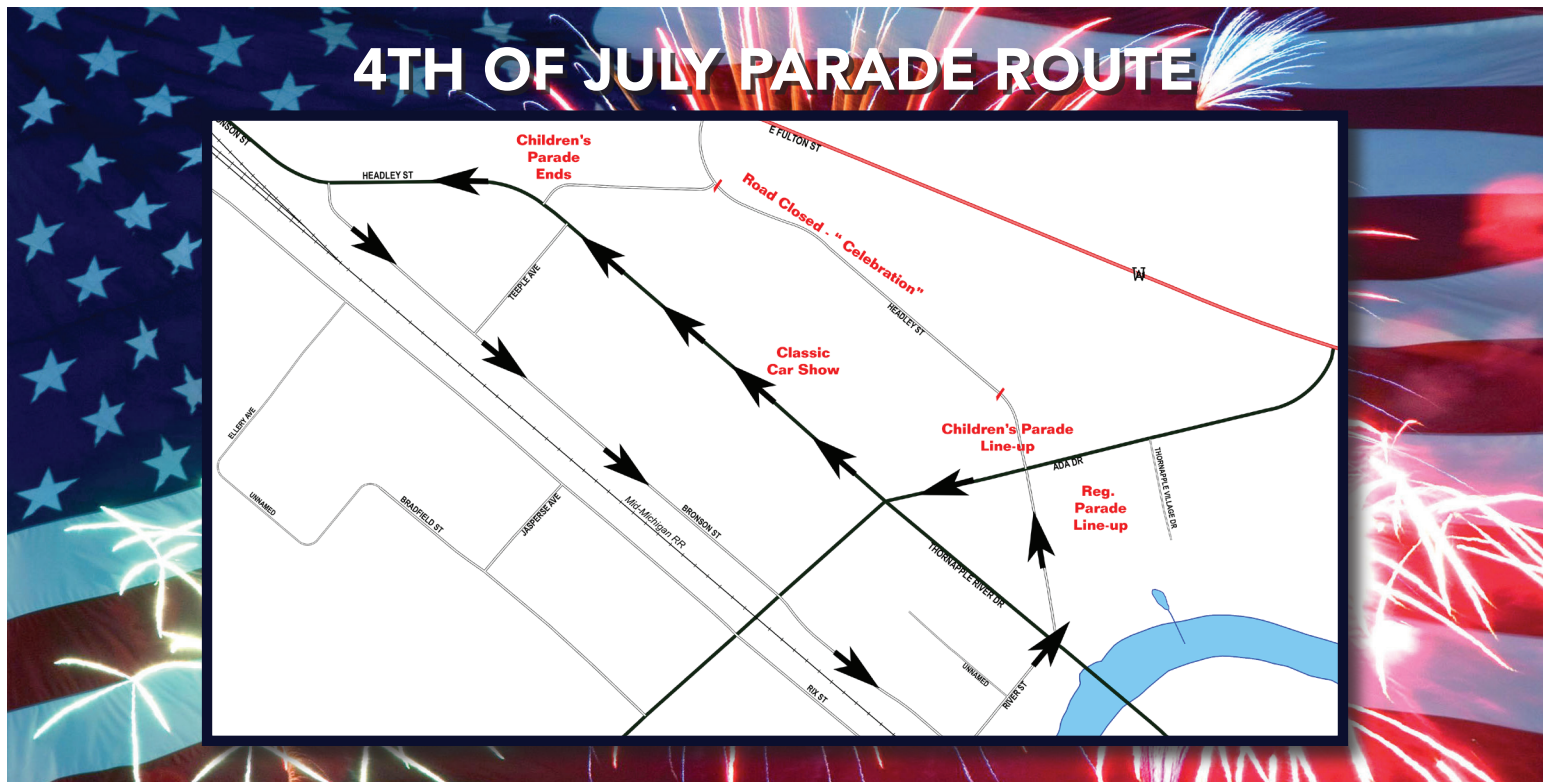
Line-up for the main parade will be in the McDonald's/ Vitales/Zeytin parking lot (or at least what's left of it) and will spill out into Headley Street between Ada and River. The

route will be the same as last year, north on Thornapple River, south on Bronson, east on River and back to the parking lot.

We know we will be crunched for space and we also know that parking will be a challenge. The alternative was not doing the activities at all this year, but we have decided to give it our best shot.

The celebration will continue in the somewhat reconfigured "green space" between Headley and M-21. We will have the same children's activities, rides, music, and food. Everything is free except any food you decide to purchase. The car show will take place as before in the parking lot of The Community.

Fireworks will have a new location this year . . . Ada Christian School. Parking will be available at Ada Christian School as well as Ada Congregational Church, Unity Church, St. Roberts, and Forest Hills Central High and Middle Schools.

SMART911 is here!



Smart911, what is it and how does it work? I am so glad you asked! **Smart911.com** is a website that is secure and confidential. You visit the website and put information in that you want police, fire and rescue personnel to know.

Once you visit the website, you create a profile. The profile you create contains your personal information such as phone numbers, address, and medical information that is important and specific for your family. The profile is not just a fill in the blank document. It allows you to attach photos and contact phone numbers for additional family. When you are done adding information to your profile, you submit it and the website holds this information.

What happens when you call 911? Another good question. Kent County Dispatch has a separate screen that pops up from Smart911 that has your profile attached. The information you put on your personal profile is now available to the emergency dispatcher. For example, if you added that a family member has a disease that affects their breathing and dispatch receives a 911 call but the caller is not audible, dispatch may send rescue personnel to respond for a medical emergency.

I have a friend who even added that he has a 1969 Camaro in his garage and in case of a fire please save the car first. I don't know in his case if that would really happen, but it is a good example of the information you can add to your personal profile.

I have another person who added that they have three dogs and listed the names of the dogs and the veterinarian's information if first responders needed it.

One of the best features of Smart911 is that our society is fading out land lines and transitioning to only cell phones. However, when you call 911 from your cell phone and cannot speak or you lose signal, sometimes dispatch cannot find you. The 911 call is tracked to a small area often times a square mile but not always an exact location. As you can imagine location is vital in an emergency. In Smart911 you can preregister a different address for your cell phone, so when you call 911 and lose signal, dispatch can look at the location given from the cell tower and look at addresses you registered at and see where you may likely be.

Lastly, the best example is something that our cell phones have in them, which is the In Case Of Emergency (ICE) contact. This website allows you to enter that information in as well. This is great for family members who are aging or in poor health. It allows emergency personnel to contact their emergency contact for additional information on the patient or to update the contact about their family member's status.

Smart911.com is a good website that allows the information you want the first responders to have upon arrival of your home. Take a look for yourself and make a choice of completing the profile or not based upon your specific situation. I am not an expert on Smart911 by any means, but I can see the benefits of information accessible to first responders sooner than later.

Smoke Detectors - EXPIRATION DATES

Recently we have been called to homes because the smoke detectors have been sounding. The cause is usually older batteries; however, what we are finding is the detector has reached its recommended life.



It is recommended that smoke detectors be replaced every 10 years. This applies to hard wire and battery operated detectors. Smoke detectors can save your life, but only if they are working properly. 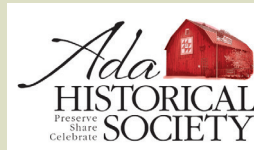
Tuesday, July 4 – Fourth of July parade & festivities

Everything these days is all about 'global'. Distribution, marketing and even education are all jostling to claim their service to the world's shoppers at large. Everything you see when you visit every Tuesday is produced on a nearby farm or created by someone from the surrounding communities – perhaps someone you know.

It brings a different perspective to shopping and selecting what will be part of your pantry stock. It's a sense of place tied to the food you choose and bring home.



The speed is a little different as well. No hustling through the store, weaving through the aisles to grab items on your list or fighting to get the best looking veg before it wilts. DOOR TO DOOR SALES

Ada has regulations and rules that need to be followed in order for a person to solicit, or go door to door offering something for a fee. The person soliciting must go to the township and fill out an application. A brief back ground investigation is done before a permit is issued. The permit is a picture ID that is to be visible and clearly states he /she can solicit in Ada Township. This permit allows them to go door to door in the community unless the community is marked with a No Soliciting sign.



The applicant still has specific times he / she can solicit, and a resident can still complain on the solicitor if the person is rude, aggressive or makes the resident uncomfortable. If you have a complaint about a solicitor who has a permit, contact Ada Township Clerk's Office at 676-9191 x20. If the person does not have a permit contact the Sheriff's department at 632-6100.

Political campaigning is exempt from the permit process.

FACILITY USE

Alcohol is not allowed in the parks or park facilities.

Walking & Bike Paths: Located throughout the Township and the Parks. Maps available.

Facility Reservations and Rentals: Contact the Park office for scheduling and fees.

Ada Park Shelter & Gazebo: Available April - October.

Roselle Park meeting room: Available on a limited basis for education programs, non-profit groups, Ada community groups and local businesses.

Athletic Fields: For public use, area leagues and instructional programs.

UPDATES ON ADA TOWNSHIP PARKS

ROSELLE PARK

The Master Plan for Roselle Park is being updated this summer. This is part of a process we go through every couple of years as we assess development and use needs. Some items under review include the non-paved trails in the north section of the park, adding a picnic gazebo, updating the old parking lot and restoration of the old lagoon. Comments are welcome. Please contact the Park office for more details.

"SETTLERS GROVE" RIVERSHORE PARK

"Settlers Grove" is the new proposed park to be developed alongside the Thornapple River in Ada Village. Final planning stages and construction plans are underway. The new "River Street" is planned for construction starting in August. That street will become the edge of the park. Installation of amenities for the site, such as walkways, tables, a playground and/or amphitheater are targeted for 2018. For input, review of the plans or review of donor opportunities, please contact the Park office.

KNAPP CORNER PRESERVE

This new development is a small 2 acre preserve at the corner of Knapp Street and Grand River drive. Our stewardship teams have been working to clean up the site and will later add native wildflowers and trees. A "Welcome to Ada" sign will also be installed.

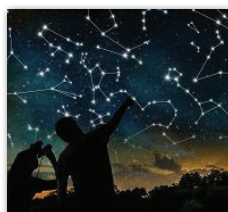
