The Ada Township Board has again voted to adopt the Principles of Governance recommended by the Michigan Townships Association. These are standards set by the MTA and re-adopted every four years after new township board members are elected. In it, the board pledges to:

- Actively pursue education and knowledge, and embrace best practices
- Treat all persons with dignity, respect and impartiality, without prejudice or discrimination
- Practice openness and transparency in our decisions and actions
- Cooperate in all reasonable ways with other governmental entities and consider the impact our decisions may have outside our township's borders
- Communicate to the public township issues, challenges and successes, and welcome the active involvement of stakeholders to further the township's well-being
- Strive for compliance with all state and federal statutory requirements
- Refuse to participate in any decisions or activities for personal gain, at the expense of the best interests of the township
- Further the understanding of the obligations and responsibilities of American citizenship, democratic government and freedom

Vendors are standing at the ready between 9 a.m. and 2 p.m. in the parking lot of The Community Church and are always eager to show you what is new from their farms. We also have lots of unique homemade treats from new vendors just starting to build their business along with our established vendors. Your business is important to both, so be sure you make a visit to everyone to see the latest!

We are lucky so many vendors consider our market as a must-add to their weekly rotation. Some of them only make it every other week or once a month and others only when their product is in high season (such as blueberries). 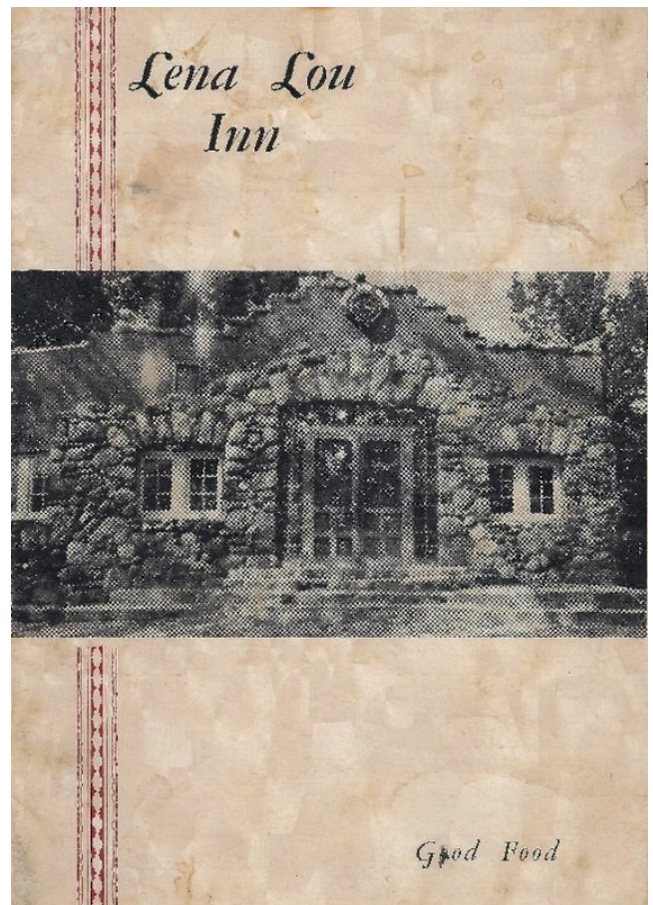

Gypsy Moths Have Arrived in Ada Township

You are likely well aware by now that portions of the Township have seen a large outbreak of gypsy moths. The Township is planning on having a gypsy moth egg mass survey completed in the fall of this year. Once the survey is complete, the Township will better understand the full impact and damage of the Gypsy Moths, which can aid in creation of a plan for treatment in the spring of 2022.

Leonard Field Park Improvements

A grant has been submitted to the MI DNR for funding to support improvements to the riverfront access, decks, and accessibility in the park. Bike Paths and Non-Motorized Trails

This fall, maintenance and repair work will be conducted on the following sections:

- Ada Drive from Alta Dale to the west
- Consumers Energy Trail (Ada Dr. to Hall St.)
- Replacement of three bridges on Ada Dr.
- Grand River Nature Area trail section

The Township has issued a request for bids to construct a new pedestrian path on Fase Street connecting Thornapple River Drive to the eastern extent of Fase Street. This section is planned to start construction in September and be completed in late October. Future plans are being developed for a pathway along Kamp Twins to connect to Buttrick Avenue, but will not be completed in 2021 due to additional permitting requirements for the railroad crossing.

The trails committee is continuing to review options for new pedestrian pathways and will present a list of recommendations to the Township Board at a future meeting. The initial phase will focus on a multi-year plan over the next five years. More details available soon.
